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MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE GRANTSVILLE CITY COUNCIL, HELD ON JUNE 20, 2012 AT THE GRANTSVILLE CITY HALL, 429 EAST MAIN STREET, GRANTSVILLE, UTAH. THE MEETING BEGAN AT 7:00 P.M.

CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.

Mayor and Council Members Present: Mayor Brent Marshall and Council Members Mike Johnson, James Vera, Scott Stice, Mike Colson and Neil Critchlow.

Appointed Officers and Employees Present: City Attorney Ron Elton and City Recorder Rachel Wright.

Citizens and Guests Present: Colleen Brunson, Kent Liddiard, Angela Grant, Sheldon Riches, Gene Gordon, Butch Barton, Barry Pitt, Erik Stromberg, Tom Randle, Silas Smith and Tom Tripp. Mayor Marshall welcomed Scout Troop 1312.

Mayor Marshall asked the audience to join him in the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

A. Proposed rezoning for Grantsville Estates, LLC / Clark Realty, LLC to rezone 200 acres located south of Nygreen Street and east of South Willows Estates from an RR-5 / RR-1 to R-1-21 / RR-1 for the purpose of subdividing into a residential development.

Mayor Marshall opened the public hearing to receive comments on the proposed rezoning. No comments were offered and the Mayor closed the public hearing.

B. Grantsville City Council will hold a public hearing to consider the appointment of a City Council Member to replace the unexpired term of James Vera.

Mayor Marshall opened the public hearing to receive comments on appointment of a City Council Member to replace the unexpired term of James Vera. No comments were offered and the Mayor closed the public hearing.

C. Proposed 2012-2013 Budget.

Mayor Marshall opened the public hearing to receive comments on the proposed 2012-2013 budget. No comments were offered and the Mayor closed the public hearing.

D. Proposed 2011-2012 Budget Adjustments.

Mayor Marshall opened the public hearing to receive comments on the proposed 2011-2012 budget amendments. No comments were offered and the Mayor closed the public hearing.

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E. Proposed Salary Increases for Statutory, Elected and Appointed Officers.

Mayor Marshall opened the public hearing to receive comments on the proposed salary increases for statutory, elected and appointed officers. No comments were offered and the Mayor closed the public hearing.

AGENDA:

1. Summary Action Items:

- a. Approval of Minutes of the May 16, 2012 City Council meeting.
- b. Approval of Bills in the sum of \$380,766.49.
- c. Personnel Matters: Clerk II Administrative Assistant, Clerk II Accounts Payable and Clerk III Utilities/Cemetery job descriptions.

Motion: Councilman Stice made a motion to approve the summary action items. Councilman Critchlow seconded the motion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

2. Consideration of Ordinance 2012-10 rezoning 200 acres of land south of Nygreen Street from a RR-5 / RR-1 zoning designation to an R-1-21 / RR-1 zoning designation. (Grantsville Estates, LLC & Clark Realty, LLC).

Mayor Marshall commented that the rezoning was given approval by the Planning Commission. Mayor Marshall stated that the rezone is requesting the R-1-21 zoning designation for 80 acres and the RR-1 zoning designation for 120 acres. Councilman Johnson commented that the current zoning designation is RR-5 and RR-1.

Motion: Councilman Vera made a motion to approve Ordinance 2012-10 rezoning 200 acres of land south of Nygreen Street from an RR-5 / RR-1 zoning designation to an R-1-21 / RR-1 zoning designation for the purpose of subdividing the property into a residential development. Councilman Johnson seconded the motion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

3. Appointment of Council Member to replace the unexpired term of James Vera.

Mayor Marshall stated that the City received 7 declaration of candidacies to replace the unexpired term of James Vera. He stated that one of the applicants was unable to attend the council meeting. Mayor Marshall stated that each eligible candidate present will be called in alphabetical order by last name and allowed approximately three (3) minutes to make comments about themselves and why they would be the right candidate for the position. At the conclusion of each candidate presenting themselves to the council, city council members will be able to ask questions of the candidate, including discussion of the character, professional competence, or physical or mental health of the candidate. At the conclusion of the presentation and questioning of all the candidates, he will call out each candidate's name, with council members casting a single vote for the candidate they wish to vote for, each vote being announced for public record. If either of the top two positions end in a tie the winner will be selected by lot in the presence of the council. The two candidates that receive the most votes will be reconsidered by the council. He stated he will ask the council if they have any remaining questions, comments, or if the council wishes to hear from the remaining candidates. Upon the conclusion of the second round of discussions, he will ask for the council's vote on the final candidates. The candidate that receives the

majority vote will be the Grantsville City Councilman – Elect. The candidate will be sworn in July 2nd time depending on availability.

- Butch Barton: Mr. Barton gave the City Council some background information. He stated that he is 62 years old has been married for 43 years has 5 children and 16 grandchildren. He commented that he is a retired fireman after 32 years. He stated that he also served in the US Army in Viet Nam. He stated that he served on City Council in the past from about 1985-1990. He stated that he was a member of the volunteer fire department and held the position of chief. He now is a senior member of the fire department. He stated that he is retired and has more time now. He commented that he feels he can put in a good amount of time and effort into the position. He stated that the first duty would be to the people of the city, after think about taxes and the city budget, the employees of the city and city infrastructure.

Councilman Stice asked Mr. Barton what makes him the most qualified to serve. Mr. Barton stated that he believes all the candidates are qualified. He stated that his past experience and time that he can put into the position. He commented that he is truly interested in accomplishing the job. Councilman Stice asked if you had to choose would you cut service or raise taxes. Mr. Barton stated that there isn't a single answer both sides would need to be looked at and weighed and he would base his decision on whatever would be best for the City.

Councilman Critchlow asked Mr. Barton how he feels about serving the community. Mr. Barton stated that he married a Grantsville girl and has lived in the City for 40 years. He stated he feels people have an obligation to give back to their community in some way and he would like to give back by serving on the council.

Councilman Vera asked Mr. Barton what his vision would be in 20 years. Mr. Barton stated that you need to look at what is best for the City. He stated that the City is growing and looking into the future you need to look at Grantsville as a whole and look at maintaining what the City has and look at the growth.

Councilman Colson asked what Mr. Barton's experience is with budgeting. Mr. Barton stated that in his professional job he operated a 3.7 million dollar annual budget and managed 29 individuals. He stated that when he was on the City Council the council members were responsible for a portion of the budget then discussed the budget as a whole. He stated that he also maintained the fire department budget as Chief.

Councilman Johnson asked what single best asset Mr. Barton would bring to Grantsville City. Mr. Barton stated that he can do the job. He stated that I bring me. He commented that he has done it in the past, he is a people person and is a hard worker.

- Barry Vern Pitt: Mr. Pitt thanked Councilman James Vera for the service provided to Grantsville City. He stated he is interested in the vacant position. He commented that he has lived in Grantsville City for 11 years and grew up in Tooele County. He stated that he is the assistant soft ball coach with Grantsville High School. He remarked that he is employed with Tooele Valley Mental Health and teaches classes. He stated that as a retired police officer he knows what it is like being an employee, managed employees and has worked with budgets. He stated that he

would appreciate the Council's support. He stated he worked for Tooele City and helped with the police department budget. He remarked that his wife works for Tooele City, but her heart is in Grantsville and always will be. He stated that he has been questioned where his loyalty would be. He stated that he is a Grantsville resident that he moved here 11 years ago. He commented that he loves living in a small city. He stated that he knows things need to be kept confidential and does not have a problem with this. He stated that as a police officer and Tooele Valley Mental Health worker confidentiality is very important. He stated that he does not have a problem keeping things confidential and discussing things with his wife or another jurisdiction.

Councilman Stice asked Mr. Pitt what makes him the most qualified to serve. Mr. Pitt stated that he does not have an agenda that he wants to do what is best for Grantsville City. He stated that whether it is Grantsville City or working with the youth he is open minded, listens and studies.

Councilman Critchlow asked Mr. Pitt how he views the responsibility of a councilman to the citizens of Grantsville. Mr. Pitt stated that he wants to make people happy. He commented that he knows he cannot make everyone happy that you have to act within means.

Councilman Vera asked Mr. Pitt what his vision is for Grantsville in 20 years. Mr. Pitt stated that one thing he would like to see is a larger police department, more recreation and parks for youth, a balanced budget, and more business to help sustain and maintain a rural community.

Councilman Colson asked Mr. Pitt what he sees is the major issue facing Grantsville as a community. Mr. Pitt stated that one major issue he sees is public safety that there are not enough police officers.

Councilman Johnson asked Mr. Pitt what single asset he would bring to Grantsville City. Mr. Pitt stated experience working with the community. He commented that he is easy going, but can make a decision and he is honest.

- Thomas L. Randle: Mr. Randle stated that he has sat on the city council before and worked with budgets for 20 years as a volunteer. He stated that he went through the big boom period and believes the City is approaching a new boom. He commented that he thinks that the City can do better. He stated that the City has great potential. He remarked that he sees one of the major problems is the need to bring in more commercial business to the City. He stated that currently there isn't a place to put a major business unless it is on the outskirts of town. He commented that he has lived here for 37 years and does believe that there are other problems coming up. He stated that with his experience he could assist.

Councilman Stice asked if you had to choose would you cut service or raise taxes. Mr. Randle stated that you would need to analyze the situation. He stated that you may not need to cut services to be more efficient. He stated that he has 20 years of budget experience and often you just need to look at being more efficient at spending money.

Councilman Critchlow asked Mr. Randle how he views the responsibility of a councilman to the citizens of Grantsville. Mr. Randle stated that you have to be able to give citizens services such as sewer, water, and keep the streets intact with minimal amount of money. He stated that he

knows there are some big expenditures. He commented that within a month of moving to Grantsville City the utilities went up significantly. Instead of taking care of the project and planning for the future to help offset the costs the citizens experienced a large increase all at once. He commented planning is very important.

Councilman Vera asked how he would recommend finding a place for large businesses. Mr. Randle stated a section for commercial needs to be blocked out in the City maps. He stated that Main Street is spotted with residential. He stated that sooner or later houses will need to be torn down or put the commercial businesses out of the community. He stated that the planning needs to be researched and planned to keep commercial within the City. He stated that there was a vision that City Hall would be the center of the commercial district. He stated that currently the commercial district is scattered. He stated that anytime someone comes in to start a business they have to go through a massive battle. He stated that if there is a plan then the City does not have to worry about it and the business owners know where they can locate. He commented that he knows that there is an industrial area, but it is small.

Councilman Colson asked Mr. Randle how he would rate the City's infrastructure. Mr. Randle stated that currently he is not pleased with the infrastructure. He stated that he drives down Hale Street everyday which needs a lot of work. He stated that he knows that there are other locations that are getting rough. He stated that infrastructure is one area that he would like to address. He commented that the sewer system also needs to be larger and the streets need to be crack sealed.

Councilman Johnson asked Mr. Randle what years he served on the City Council. Mr. Randle stated 1995-1998. Councilman Johnson asked what has changed, what problems is the City facing now versus what the City faced before? Mr. Randle stated that they were facing 35 subdivisions at one time. They just finished the sewer plant. Councilman Johnson asked what Mr. Randle's greatest asset is. Mr. Randle stated knowledge, experience and he knows everyone.

- Silas D. Smith: Mr. Smith stated that he has lived in Grantsville City for 25 years. He commented that his wife, Susan Smith, taught at Grantsville High School. He stated that he attended LDS Business College and received an Administrative Assistant Associates Degree. He later got his Bachelor's degree. He stated he started working as a secretary. He remarked that he worked for Chevron where his last assignment was taking care of the accounts payable. He stated he is retired from Chevron. He commented that he works at Wal-Mart and substitute teaches on the days he is off. He stated he intends on staying in Grantsville. He remarked that he agrees with Mr. Barton that infrastructure is important. He stated that while working at Chevron he learned that what you cannot see is still important. He stated he agrees with Mr. Randle that commercial development is very important and needs to be guided.

Councilman Stice asked Mr. Smith what makes him the most qualified to serve. Mr. Smith stated that he is a fresh face that brings new ideas. He stated that he does not have preconceived ideas about how things should be.

Councilman Critchlow asked Mr. Smith how he views the responsibility of a councilman to the citizens of Grantsville. Mr. Smith stated that you do what is best for the community as a whole. He stated that while working for Wal-Mart he sees a large variety of people as well as with

teaching where he could get their views on certain issues.

Councilman Vera asked if you were king for a day and all the needs of Grantsville City are taken care of and you could do something nice for the citizens what would it be. Mr. Smith commented that there is a lack of sidewalks throughout the City. He stated he would put in more sidewalks.

Councilman Colson asked what Mr. Smith's experience is with budgeting. Mr. Smith stated that majority of his budgeting experience has been with running a household budget. He stated that at Chevron he was responsible for the accounts payable. He stated that each invoice was put with a contract and he understands that sometimes you just do not have the money.

Councilman Johnson asked Mr. Smith if he would raise taxes or live within the current budget. Mr. Smith stated that individual items would need to be looked at. He stated that priorities change. He commented that it depends how things are. Councilman Johnson asked Mr. Smith what is his biggest asset. Mr. Smith stated that he is a fresh face and offers a new way of looking at things.

- Erik Stromberg: Mr. Stromberg expressed appreciation for Councilman Vera's service. He stated that he has campaigned with each of the council members and they know what he stands for. He stated that he loves Grantsville City. He commented it is where he grew up and has no intentions of leaving. He stated it is where he is raising his kids. He stated that he wants to see Grantsville be a place that his children are proud to live at and grow up at. He stated he wants it to be a place that his children will consider living.

Councilman Stice asked Mr. Stromberg what makes him the most qualified to serve. Mr. Stromberg stated that all the good answers have been taken. He commented that he cannot honestly say he is the most qualified. He remarked that he serves on the Planning Commission and has a broader aspect of what is going on in the City. He stated that he has a lot of contacts on the Capital. He stated that laws made on the hill can affect the City. He stated he has spent a lot of time on the Capital and will be a voice for the City.

Councilman Critchlow asked Mr. Stromberg how he views the responsibility of a councilman to the citizens of Grantsville. Mr. Stromberg stated the biggest thing is a council member needs to be open and honest. He stated that you need to make sure that how you feel and why you are doing something is for the best interest of Grantsville City.

Councilman Vera asked if you were king for a day and all the needs of Grantsville City are taken care of and you could do something nice for the citizens what would it be. Mr. Stromberg stated that one thing he would like to do if all the needs were taken care of would be to construct a community center where the youth could hang out. He stated that his wife grew up in Dugway where they had a teen center that was open to all the kids. She said it was a great place to hang out and the parents all knew where their children were at.

Councilman Colson asked Mr. Stromberg in his opinion what are the top 3 issues facing Grantsville now and in the next 5 years. Mr. Stromberg stated that the first issue would be management of growth. He stated that the City is lacking business. He stated we need to work on

getting a tax base and it would give opportunities for those that live here to work closer to their homes. He stated the second issue would be infrastructure. He stated that he has seen a huge improvement in infrastructure since his first campaign, but it is something that needs to continue to be worked on. He stated the third issue would be the budget. He stated that you have to have money to accomplish things in the City and you have to have a budget to do this.

Councilman Johnson asked Mr. Smith what is his biggest asset. Mr. Stromberg stated that it is his desire to serve whether it is on the Planning Commission or on City Council. He stated that he loves Grantsville and wants to see it be the best place that it can be.

- Tom Tripp: Mr. Tripp commented that I know all of you and you all know me. He stated that he feels Councilman Vera has brought diversity that was not there before. He stated that one of his accomplishments was opening the gateway to the new library. He stated that he came to appreciate Mr. Vera's diversity. He stated that there are a lot of good choices for the vacant seat. He stated that he has only been out of office for 6 months so he is up to speed on the issues. He stated that he feels he fosters a spirit of teamwork, diversity and a full examination of issues. He stated that he is an engineer by education. He commented that he deals with a large management structure and deals with large budgets. He commented that he would like to serve again, but does not want any of the council members to feel pressure to vote for him. He stated that he admires the work they all do and knows that it is not always easy. He stated that he just wants to serve.

Councilman Stice asked Mr. Tripp what makes him the most qualified to serve. Councilman Tripp stated that he recently was a council member, he has experience working with large budgets, and knows how to work with difficult people and problems. He stated that he helped with alerting flood issues. Councilman Stice asked if you had to choose would you cut service or raise taxes. Councilman Tripp stated that he shies away from raising taxes. He stated that it is the peoples' money. He commented that he can see some situations where taxes may need to be raised. He stated that he sees the duty of a council member is to first protect citizens and property, second provide services and third to make Grantsville a good place to live.

Councilman Vera asked how Mr. Tripp would bring business to the community. Mr. Tripp stated that bringing in business is challenging. He stated that he thinks the City needs to be working towards large industrial, light industry, wholesale types of businesses. He commented that Tooele City has a good business district so it is tough getting businesses to locate in Grantsville City versus Tooele City.

Councilman Colson asked Mr. Tripp in his opinion what are the top 3 issues facing Grantsville now and in the next 5 years. Mr. Tripp stated first is establishing a stable revenue source, second look to balancing residential growth and balancing the revenue. He stated that in the past some growth was built on a false view of revenue. He stated the transportation corridor also needs to be worked on.

Councilman Johnson asked Mr. Tripp what his biggest asset is that he would bring to Grantsville City. Mr. Tripp stated that he brings candy. He stated that he does not get emotionally wrapped up in issues. He commented that he has a forward vision.

Mayor Marshall asked for a vote from the Council Members. Councilmen Vera and Critchlow voted for Butch Barton. Councilman Colson voted for Barry Pitt. Councilmen Johnson and Stice voted for Tom Tripp. Tom Randle, Silas Smith and Erik Stromberg did not receive any votes.

Mayor Marshall stated the two candidates that received the top two votes are Butch Barton and Tom Tripp he asked the Council Members to cast their votes for either Mr. Barton or Mr. Tripp. Councilmen Colson, Johnson and Stice voted for Tom Tripp. Councilmen Critchlow and Vera voted for Butch Barton. Tom Tripp was welcomed into the City Council as Councilman-Elect. Mayor Marshall announced that Mr. Tripp will be sworn into office July 2, 2012.

4. Consideration of Ordinance No. 2012-09 establishing the compensation of the elective, statutory and appointed officers of Grantsville City for the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

Motion: Councilman Colson made a motion to approve Ordinance No. 2012-09, an ordinance establishing the compensation for elective, statutory and appointed officers for the 2012-2013 fiscal year. Councilman Johnson seconded the motion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

5. Consideration of Resolution 2012-04 adopting the 2012-2013 fiscal year budget and setting the tax levy.

Mayor Marshall commented that the City received the certified tax rate of .004000 and proposed keeping the tax rate the same as the previous year. Councilman Vera expressed concern with keeping the tax rate the same. He stated that he is concerned with getting the City further and further behind. He remarked that the City has infrastructure needs. He commented that they do not have any real data of where the City needs to be down the road. He stated that there is an obvious concern that the City has the income to take care of future needs. He stated that he understands that the economy is down, but last year the City did not adopt the certified tax rate either so this will be the second year in the row the City does not take the recommended certified tax rate. He stated he is concerned with deferring the City's needs. Councilman Stice commented that he has read many cities are being criticized for raising taxes. He remarked that he thinks a 13% increase is too high, but does not want to see the City caught short. He stated that infrastructure is going to benefit the City. Councilman Critchlow commented that he believes the City has a sufficient amount of tax revenue and feels that it is meeting the needs of the City. He stated that he feels that the City should be responsible and keep the tax rate as low as possible. Councilman Colson commented that the City absorbed 14% last year and feels the City is on a slippery slope if we continue to not adopt the recommended certified tax rate. He stated the City has cut back to minimal and he sees it biting the City later. He agreed that 13% is too high, but feels the City should adopt half of the suggested certified tax rate increase. Councilman Johnson commented that people are struggling financially right now. He stated the City has made some great steps. He commented that he doesn't want to put the City in the same situation that it was in years ago. Finance Director Hammond stated that the revenue projections are very conservative. He stated that Wal-Mart owes the City \$43,000.00 and the City will also get the tax revenue from the Wal-Mart Distribution that will be approximately \$150,000.00. He stated that the revenue from Wal-Mart has not been included in the budget. He commented that he too does not feel the City should go year after year without adopting the certified tax rate, but believes the City will be fine to not adopt the certified tax rate this year. Councilman Critchlow stated that he would like to see the rainy day fund built up and put extra money into the City's infrastructure, but questions whether this is the right time to do that. He commented that

he gets to witness problems with the economy every day and if taxes are increased at all it will put an extra burden on those that are already struggling. He stated that he believes the City has been responsible and has made improvements to the City's infrastructure. He stated that great strides have been made to put in sidewalks, street improvements, and park and cemetery improvements. Councilman Colson stated the City has some future unknown projects. He stated one is the new library and the other is the annexation. Councilman Vera stated that the Wal-Mart revenue makes him feel better about not adopting the certified tax rate. Mayor Marshall stated that the budget is not taken lightly that it affects everyone, employees and residents. He stated that he will continue to monitor the City's finances.

Motion: Councilman Johnson made a motion to approve Resolution 2012-04 adopting the 2012-2013 fiscal year budget and setting the tax levy at .003368. Councilman Critchlow seconded the motion. Councilman Vera, Critchlow and Johnson voted in favor of the motion. Councilman Stice and Colson voted against the motion. The motion carried.

6. Consideration of Resolution 2012-05 amending the 2011-2012 fiscal year budget.

Finance Director Hammond stated that at the end of the year he must amend the budget to get as close to actual as possible. He explained that if the actual is higher than budgeted the State requires an explanation. He stated that the fund balance cannot be less than 5% or higher than 18%.

Motion: Councilman Stice made a motion to approve Resolution 2012-05 amending the 2011-2012 fiscal year budget. Councilman Vera seconded the motion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

7. Consideration of approving the Moderate-Income Housing Plan Biennial Report.

Motion: Councilman Vera made a motion to approve the Moderate-Income Housing Biennial Report as prepared by the Planning Administrator. Councilman Stice seconded the motion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

8. Mayor and Council Reports.

Mayor Marshall stated that he was part of a tour of Energy Solutions with other elected officials. He stated that they toured the disposal site and had discussion on how the hazardous waste is processed. He stated that he participated and was a committee member of the Wild Horse and Heritage Days held at the Deseret Peak Complex. He stated that he attended the EDC Utah meeting. The discussions were about future projects in the State. He commented that he attended the firemen's convention held in Logan. He stated that he attended and spoke at the dedication of the Daughters of Utah Pioneer museum at the Clark Farm. He stated that this will be a place that people can donate their artifacts so everyone can enjoy them. He stated that he met with Marilyn Candelaria from Tooele County Emergency Management and signed a paper giving Grantville City ownership of everything including vehicles that our community received from the CSEP program. He stated that he attended the open house at USU for Dr. Straquadine. He commented that Dr. Straquadine had a great vision in education for the Tooele County Valley. He remarked that Ronda Menlove will be the intern dean until a new dean is hired. He

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stated that he attended the stake holders meeting for the Utah State Homeland Security Program. Mayor Marshall stated that he attended the library meeting and needs some direction from the Council. He stated that the contractor needs to know what items the City would like to add onto the library. Attorney Elton suggested holding a special meeting to consider change orders and additions to the library.

Mayor Marshall stated that the rodeo club is asking for a loan of \$2,000.00 to pay their contractors. He stated that they are going to receive a grant and will be able to pay back the loan once they receive the grant funding. Motion: Councilman Critchlow made a motion to approve a loan of \$2,000.00 to the Rodeo Club. Councilman Colson seconded the motion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Councilman Vera expressed his appreciation to serve and for the support he has received. Mayor Marshall and all the Council Members expressed appreciation to Councilman Vera for his dedication and service to the City. They all stated that he will be missed and wished him well on his new adventure. They presented Councilman Vera with a plaque and gift from the City for his years of service to the City.

Councilman Critchlow expressed appreciation to the police department for their efforts regarding a fire on Sunday. He stated that the Planning Commission had a couple of issues that they worked through. He expressed appreciation to them for their efforts. He commented that they truly want what is best for the citizens.

Councilman Stice inquired about firework restrictions. Mayor Marshall stated that he will be putting the firework restrictions in the "From the Mayor's Desk" letter. He stated that the designated area is from Matthews Lane west to the east side of West Street, from Clark Street to Durfee Street. He stated that the subdivisions on the outskirts of the boundary are being asked to use the interior portion of the subdivision to prevent fires. Councilman Stice stated that at the Mosquito Abatement meeting they discussed that they are going to take a tax cut.
